#### **Tips for Low Data/Bandwidth/Troubled Connections:**

- Have students do voice and not video when video conferences on Zoom, Canvas Conference, etc.
  - An Open Google Doc with Q and A would be easy for students/teachers to check and add to
- HyperDocs without video or links- Students can download, complete, and re-upload
- Lecture Notes- google slides that are small file size that can be downloaded easily
- Paper still works! Have students complete work on paper and take a low-res picture to upload
  - Also saves eyes with less screen time and allows learning to “blend” more with technology
